
President's Message

December Bonsai Tips

Although your bonsai require very little attention this time of the year, don't neglect them in the rush of December. Root rot can become a big problem, if you haven't modified your watering procedure from the summer. Make sure that you water only when your bonsai's soil has gotten on the dry side. Your deciduous trees are not transpiring when their leaves have fallen, and the cool temperatures do not promote much evaporation, so your trees are not using much water. If you've been collecting and had to prune your newly collected material, be sure to seal all the cuts. They won't really start to heal until dormancy ends and by the exposure to winter winds will

draw moisture from the wounds faster than the traumatized root system can replenish it. Coat all the cut areas with Calsmate or some other sealant to give that new addition a chance to survive.

December is a good time to rewire, since the branches won't begin to swell with growth until dormancy

ends. Be careful with your deciduous material, though. Even though they are denuded and easier to wire, there is less sap in the branches now, making them more brittle. Your pines, junipers, and most other evergreens are still fairly pliable. As always, remember to use wire that is harder to bend than the branch is to train. That way you won't need to put your branches at risk from overbending in order to get the correct angle to stay. Also, the heavier wire will be less likely to scar the branch, if you don't notice the branch thickening in time.

Prepare soil now for the potting season. There are so many things to do in the early spring, that any early preparation done now will be appreciated then. Tag any trees which will need repotting. Now is the time to order



pots, so they'll be there when you need them.

The slow winter season is a good time to photograph your bonsai. [next sentence deleted due to inaccessibility of the author's cited references herein] Your deciduous material is fully exposed, and there's nothing like a black and white photograph of a tree to reveal flaws in the branch arrangement. This

can be your blueprint for pruning in the spring. Your photographs may also reveal a better front or potting angle. Keep these photographs in your record book. It can (be) quite rewarding to look over your bonsai records and note how your trees have progressed over the years. Bring your records to one of our general workshops

or the meeting to get suggestions from other members for shaping and design. If you're afraid of being pressured into cutting more than you want, just having photos or sketches can save you from regrets and still allow you to get the input from others.

THE TEXAS STATE BONSAI EXHIBIT, INC,

Fourth Annual Report

November 2004

The Texas State Bonsai Exhibit started the new year with Sheila Ward as its new secretary.

Terry, Sheila Ward and I did a presentation about our exhibit for the Dallas Bonsai Society in January and Mike and I went to Corpus Christi in February.

We now have permanent exhibit representatives in all but 2 bonsai clubs so we can keep in touch by email and let them know of our progress in building and encourage their fund raising and volunteering.

There are still some issues to be resolved concerning the land restrictions, as the two acres that we want to lease is zoned for office buildings.

The lease agreement provided by Tokyo Electron America was reviewed by the Board and our lawyer found several articles that needed to be changed or modified.

Time restraints by both lawyers have delayed the resolutions of both the land restrictions and the lease agreement.

Larry Gefeller has completed a feasibility study for us, questioning some of his friends in other non-profit organizations. This will help in future planning.

I continue to take classes at Austin Community College which maintains an extensive network of information for non profits.

A Media Workshop at the Austin American Statesman- 4 hours. 2 Public Relations seminars –8 hours. A Funders Forum-composed of 15 organizations that grant funds – stating their requirements- 8 hours. Grant writing -8 hours.

Fund Raising

Fund raising is discussed by the Board members at every monthly meeting.

In February A Taste of Austin was attended by three board members who decided, after many queries, that this type of fundraiser would not be profitable for us at this time.

For the Austin annual exhibit in May and the LSBF Convention in Houston we exhibited two large question and answer posters, a picture and a live bonsai to illustrate why we needed a permanent exhibit. A TV showed continuous views of Japanese gardens. Our fundraiser was the 5 day Princess Cruise for two, for a \$10 ticket.

The Bonsai Society of Dallas sold the most cruise tickets (52) winning the lecture demonstration. Mike Smoller was the winner of the bonsai for selling 21 tickets, and Paul Serratt was close behind with 20.John Miller sold 11. Total tickets bought per club:

Our profit was only \$1,080. Since this project was not appealing to the majority of you, we have sent questionnaires to our representatives asking for your input on fund raising.

Our Garage Sale was quite successful, due to perfect weather, good location and many large items that our members brought the Friday before. We even had some never used wedding presents from Kathleen Williamson of Houston.

We thank all who donated items and came to our sale and especially those who worked all day Saturday and Sunday. Del De Los Santos, Els Ulug, Eileen Urshel, Elizabeth and Bill Cody, Sheila and Terry Ward, Alisan Clarke and Audrey Lanier for her garage and yard. Our profit was \$1,101.72.

In order to stimulate individual yearly contributions, we will shortly list our contributors on our Web site under the appropriate donor heading.

Our largest contributors this year have been: Steven Hendricks (LSBF Pres.), Ft. Worth, our advisor Kathy Shaner, CA, the Austin Bonsai Society, Pete Parker, Katy and the donation by Joe and Sandra Wait of 3 granite garden lanterns and 2 water basins for a total of \$2,500 making them Lifetime members of TTSBE.

Treasurer Bill Cody reports our current bank balance is \$15,734.

The last quarterly statement from Randalls was \$17.96 statewide. This is Free money and we can do better!

In a grant proposal, all volunteer hours are counted as it shows local community support for this project. Foundations also look at a diversified fund raising program focused on **annual giving by individuals**. We have pledge cards for this purpose (see your representative to TTSBE) and also PayPal on our website.

Along with your church United Way, Food Bank, etc. please consider adding TTSBE to your list of non profit contributions for each year. Giving a little at a time combined with volunteer hours will add up to a recognition plaque on our fence.

We will actively pursue asking Foundations for grants as soon as the lease is signed but we need to show your support to be successful.
